MOST Collaborative

- Collaborative began in 2013 with City, MMSD, County and OST Providers
- Over 50 OST providers involved
- Data and Quality Improvement have been goals from the beginning
- Over 18 months of work produced a <u>hands-on</u> guide to build <u>research-based</u> best practices throughout OST organizations

Purpose of the Guide

- Provide INSPIRATION for today and ASPIRATIONS for tomorrow
- Something for everyone to strengthen programs
- ▶ A common language for OST providers
- Support for Continuous Improvement Process (CPI)
- Proven, research-based ideas and practices

The Development Process

- ►OST Community came together to define what makes our programs great
- ▶ Diverse group of organizations worked together in the creation of the guide.
- ▶ It has been an iterative process and there will be modifications in he future

Common Language

The guide includes agreed-upon definitions for words commonly used in OST programs.

What the Guide is and isn't

- ▶ The guide and the building blocks are NOT intended to become another system of sanctions and rewards.
- ▶ They ARE intended to help us build research-based best practices into every step.
- ▶ It is about reflection and support to quality
- ▶ This is the foundation for Madison OST programs.
- Creates a common language among providers.

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

- ▶Don't simply jump to the building blocks
- ▶ Read the entire guide
- ▶ Understand the intent of MOST
- Designed with questions to spark conversations

BUILDING BLOCKS

- ▶ Basic building blocks originated from MN OST model
- Input from coalition was provided at multiple points as building blocks were refined
- ▶ Feedback from Coalition members led to a building block about racial and cultural inclusion.

We BELIEVE

- ► Created by researching national afterschool standards and OST system best practices
- ▶ Re-defined to reflect Madison's values and beliefs
- These statements serve as the foundation for the MOST effective practices building blocks.
- ▶This work was informed by youth, parents and care givers and the community

Continuous Program Improvement Cycle



MOST CPI Cycle

- ▶ There are other models for continuous improvement
- ► MOST chose this one
- Quality isn't something to achieve, it is learning and practice.
- Everyone will come to it at different points, and will engage as they can.



- Identify strategies and activities to meet program goals
- Identify measurement benchmarks and tools
- Determine the resource needed to support the plan



- ▶ Implement the plan
- Collect data that aligns with your benchmarks
- Invite feedback throughout implementation



- Compare what is happening against your plan
- Analyze and interpret data against plan
- ▶ Take time to reflect and celebrate success



- ▶ Identify causes of what is/isn't working
- Identify trainings/professional development and supports
- ► Make an improvement **plan** > **do** (implement changes) and so on...

Throughout The Process

- Review Research and Resources
- ► Evaluate each Building Block
- Provide Professional Development
- Educate external stakeholders about program and progress
